Pope Francis calls us to an inclusive politics of dialogue, "that gives people a say in the decisions that impact their lives.", to an economy "that can offer every person access

to a dignified existence" and to "a culture of encounter". Politics of dialogue, economics of inclusion and a culture of encounter are all expressions of Gospel values. All are legitimate fields of proclamation of the Good News, the work of a Church whose nature is to evangelize.

This is a very big agenda and truly a mission for us to follow of which Francis advises, "When you think globally, you can be paralyzed." When we are paralyzed we cannot act and nothing

happens. We can all say that it is too big for us to tackle; and it is! I try, but really don't understand all the issues or

comprehend the world. Surely, the big picture is too big, too complex for all of us. An old saying might help us, "Think globally, act locally." How can we fulfill our mission to change the world, and bring about the Reign of God, at our own local level?


sisters and brothers. It requires the quality of dialogue; to listen carefully and to speak truthfully, to see all as an equal, to come with mercy and compassion.
